Festival of Sails

The Wednesday Twilights were well attended, with the Off the Beach Committee looking to extend this for the coming season.

Power Boats

The power boat group were extremely unlucky with the weather this year and were only able to get two NavRallys completed. There has been plenty of feedback on what the Powerboat community would like to participate in at RGYC, and will extend its traditional NavRally and fishing competition events to include destination cruising with other yachts and powerboats. Members are looking to host visitors from other clubs who are interested in reciprocating at destinations like Westernport Bay and the Gippsland Lakes.

Cruising

Cruising sailors have been very active this year, with a number of boats participating in the Van Diemen's Land Circumnavigation of Tasmania, being conducted by the Royal Yacht Club of Tasmania supported by RGYC. All accounts have been that our members had a great time, with Stuart Dickson and Bill Newman providing a Cruising Dinner presentation to RGYC members. Others have travelled north for winter, several participating in regattas along the Queensland coast.

Sailing Academy

The Sailing Academy has been a huge success for RGYC, culminating with the award of Victorian Discover Sailing Centre of the Year. We have put record numbers of both junior sailors and adults through the Academy. Our focus now is to help these new sailors and families to become regular participants at the club.

Into the Future

There are many opportunities and challenges for our Club as we move into the 2017/18 season.

Festival of Sails is going to be one of the best yet, with the Passage Race to be held on Australia Day for the 175th anniversary of the first race in 1844.

The Sailing Academy has an opportunity to replace its ageing keelboat training vessel, and needs the full support of members to realise the vision to fund a modern J/70 fleet.

New racing and cruising opportunities are also being put forward, including destination cruising, match racing, and new ways are being discussed to attract the wider community of Geelong to our great Club.
